


Shop Tip (submitted by Herb Stoops)



I used to guess where a biscuit slot should go, but now I make sure. With my biscuit joiner, I cut slots for #0, #10, and #20 biscuits into a piece of scrapwood. Then, I

marked the centerline on some matching biscuits, and glued them into the slots, as shown *below*. Now I have a handy guide that shows me where to cut when there's no room for guesswork.
